So it is to these two delightful people that we owe the preservation of this historic moment, and I hope that you will take as much pleasure from this as I do.

The President's Badge

Some time ago it was decided by the Council that we should commission a President's Badge. After a great deal of deliberation and consultation, it was decided to ask a young silversmith in Edinburgh - Caroline Temple - to do the work. This was in particular because of the special skills which she had in enamelling. The badge is almost ready and will be worn for the first time at the Culloden Memorial Service, this year. The badge which comprises the Association Shield will have red and yellow enamelled bars on a Britannia silver backing. The targe will be highly polished silver with a rivet effect punched on to the surface and the Lochaber axes will be hand-fretted. The overall size of the badge will be 2½ in by 2 in and will be suspended by a red and gold ribbon. A big thank you to all members who contributed to the cost of production of this very special project which will be worn with pride by CCAS Presidents.

An Historic Encounter

The date was the 19th April 2008, the place, Drummoisie Moor, and this was the first time the three gentlemen in the photograph had met. In the centre The Right Reverend Mark Strange, Bishop of Moray Ross and Caithness, is proud to represent



the Episcopalian Church on the battlefield, where a good proportion of the Jacobite army was of the same faith, and where, 262 years before, a member of his clan fought in Elcho and Balmerino's Lifeguards. Robert Strange was an artist, and went on to become one of the foremost engravers of the age. To the Bishop's right is David Lumsden of Cushnie, whose family also bears the name of Strange. Andrew Lumisden was Assistant Private Secretary to Prince Charles Edward and he later married Isabella, sister of Robert Strange. Finally, to the right of the picture, is Count Peter Pininski, whose book 'The Stuart's Last Secret', published in Britain in 2002, revealed that he is directly descended, by blood, from the Prince.

Peter had been staying with me in order to attend the Culloden ceremony, and later to give his Cameron cousins an absorbing account of how, on his Mother's side, and directly through the female line,

he is descended from John Cameron of Fassifern, the Gentle Lochiel's younger brother. We had met when he came to the National Trust Centre in 2002 for a 'book signing'.

It had been a beautiful morning. The Ceremony had gone well, and I was surrounded by Clanspeople and acquaintances who all seemed to have cameras, but a few moments later, when I saw my friends deep in conversation and realized the significance of the occasion, there was not a camera to be seen! Most people had departed for the clan markers for their individual remembrances and only holiday-makers remained nearby. I looked around frantically and saw, about twenty metres away, two people using their cameras with enthusiasm, and in desperation I raced over to them and virtually hi'jacked them, breathlessly exhorting them to come over and photograph my group. It transpired they were Graham and Vicki Harris from Toongabbie in New South Wales, on their first visit to Scotland, and they

Culloden 09

The annual Culloden Memorial service which is organised by the Gaelic Society of Inverness is always a most moving event. The Clan Cameron has been attending the service for many years now and I have always a mixture of emotions - sadness at the loss of life and futility of the battle; pride in the loyalty of our forebears: wonder at the solemnity of the occasion.

The service will take place at 11.00 on Saturday, 18th April and you are advised to be there and ready to proceed to the Cairn at 10.45 As has been the custom we will be led as a Clan by our piper - Astie Cameron. Following the laying of the wreaths, those who wish may march out behind Astie to the Cameron marker stone to place a simple floral tribute and then back to the Cameron grave to place a bunch of flowers at the Cameron gravestone.

After the formal part of the memorial service, the clan has, in the past few years, gone to a local restaurant for lunch and after-lunch entertainment. This year we are going back to the Cawdor Tavern, in Cawdor. The arrangements for the lunch and booking is being undertaken this year by Duncan Cameron. Duncan's contact details are:

CAMERONS IN THE NEWS

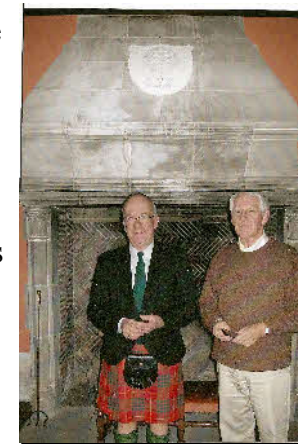

Rt Rev Douglas Cameron

This 1929 castle was built by the inventor of the screw-top who lost all his money in the 1930 financial crisis. Elizabeth Cameron

It is with sadness we note the passing away of Elizabeth Cameron on December 10th, 2008 at the age of 93. She was a very talented artist particularly of wild flowers, vegetables and fruits. One of her pictures *Humanity Rose*, she donated to the Red

Cross on its 125th anniversary and this potent symbol has become a central part of several Red Cross Appeals. Along with her husband, Major Allan Cameron, they farmed Allangrange in the Black Isle. They started a frozen food business and sourced their supplies locally. She is survived by her husband, who is a brother of the late Donald Hamish Cameron of Lochiel and their two sons and daughters. This will be followed by a **Barbeque** and **Shinty Match** between the Camerons and the Frasers.

The Gathering - Saturday 1st August

Saturday is the main day of activity at the Gathering. Lochiel requested that instead of gifts, clanspeople might wish to contribute to **an Oak Woodland** at Achnacarry. The woodland will be dedicated on Saturday 1st August at 12.00. (If you wish to contribute to the woodland, see separate article on page 5)

The occasion will also be used to launch the **Cameron Heritage Trail Project** which highlights important sites in the history of the Clan Cameron.

The entertainment will contain the **quack commandos** where a sheepdog will put ducks through their paces. A **falconry display** in which different birds of prey are on show and demonstrate their skills. There will be a chain-saw sculptor, a demonstration of weapons such as swords and the famous Lochaber axe. There is a demonstration of the early kilt. There will also be Treasure hunts for adults and young people. The highlight will be the **March Past of the Clan** bearing their standards accompanied by the pipe bands. There will be an opportunity to “meet the chief” and have your photograph taken with him.



There will be stalls reflecting the best of **Highland craft work**. It is anticipated that there will be a chainsaw sculptor, and a wood turner. There will also be stalls representing the genealogy strand of Homecoming such as a genealogist, Am Baile the Highland Region photographic Database, and Lochaber Archives and the best of Lochaber foods.

In the evening there will be a **Grand Ceilidh** featuring the best of local talent particularly some of the young people who are participating in the Feisean trail. There is a real buzz about Celtic music in Lochaber. The ceilidh will probably be in the Nevis Centre starting at 7.30.

BERGUES - OCTOBER 24th-26th 08

Report by Alan Cameron

In late October, Elizabeth and I were joined by Roddy, Barry and Janet and Michael Dey - a CCAS member who lives in France at a wonderful event in the town of Bergues in Northern France. This is the town where the Gentle Lochiel died in 1748 as a result of contracting malaria which developed into meningitis. Lochiel, who had been Prince Charles Edward's staunchest ally and most ardent supporter had fled Scotland along with Prince after the debacle that was Culloden. There Lochiel had taken the role of Colonel in Chief of the Regiment d'Albanie and was at the time of his death stationed in Bergues. He died in the hospital there and being a non-Catholic was buried outside the town walls. Incidentally the building which had been the hospital was latterly the Offices of the Electricity Company and was most recently the Post Office in a very popular film, the English sub-title of which is "Welcome to the Sticks". This building has a plaque to the Gentle Lochiel which was put up 10 years ago and as the building is now a mecca for film buffs, Lochiel's plaque is much visited and remarked upon.

Some years after he was buried outside the town walls, the body was exhumed and re-buried within the cemetery. There was however, no marker to indicate where he was. Julian Hutchings from Alliance France Ecosse (and also a CCAS



Honorary Member) has been most conscientious in researching the background to Lochiel in Bergues. The result is that he, along with members of the 1745 Association - particularly John Graham arranged to have a fitting memorial placed in the cemetery and it was to the unveiling of this that we made our way across (or strictly under) the Channel in October. To add to the occasion, we were delighted to welcome Donald Andrew Cameron, Younger of Lochiel to represent his father at this historic occasion. Also present were members of the Clan Graham Association and the Royal Stewart Society.

What pleased the group greatly was the way in which the town of Bergues joined with us to make this a real occasion. The local

mayor and depute Mayor and members of the Council turned out along with the town Band. Julian had also enlisted a piper from the neighbouring town of Albert, in full Highland dress who played "The March of the Cameron Men".

The festivities started with a Carillon from the Town Bell Tower and to our surprise and pleasure, they were playing "The March of the Cameron Men". Some of our party ventured to the top of the tower - a mere 192 steps.



After lunch, we assembled in the cemetery and bearing the Lochiel standard we proceeded to the site of the plaque. After an excellent speech in English AND French by Donald Andrew, the plaque was unveiled it having been covered by a replica of Lochiel's Regiment d'Albanie standard which had been commissioned especially by Julian. (This was later presented to Donald Andrew and is now in the Achnacarry Museum.) Wreaths were laid on behalf of all of the groups and we then marched through the town - stopping to lay a wreath at the town War Memorial. There followed a reception in the Town Hall.

In the evening we dined in The Breughel Restaurant - a traditional regional restaurant where the more adventurous of us tasted the speciality dish. At the restaurant we shared the meal with the town officials and various presentations were made. Donald Andrew received the standard. He and I received books of the town and I presented a print of the Cameron Clan Lands. On the following day, the Sunday, the 1745 Association laid a wreath at the plaque- this being the exact anniversary of the Gentle Lochiel's death 260 years before.
